Following recent updates from the Department for Education surrounding attendance in schools, pupil attendance is very much a key focus for us this academic year. When pupil attendance drops below expectations, the Local Authorities will be made aware of this and can make suggestions regarding interventions or strategies to improve attendance in line with their own expectations and taking into consideration reasons behind low attendance. We know that you make every effort to ensure your child comes to school every day and understand how important it is for continuity of learning, we fully appreciate that at times there may be difficulties, for example with transport issues. Please note Headteachers/Principals may not grant any leave of absence to pupils during term time unless they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'. Please note that a family holiday is not an exceptional circumstance and will impact your child's attendance. Attendance data can be viewed on the My Child at School app and Francesca our Attendance Officer, Lisa our Assistant Head and Luke our SENCO continue to support in all matters regarding attendance. ## **Rufus Class**



Hello and welcome to the new school year in Rufus class!

The members of Rufus class have done really well changing classrooms and settling in to a new routine. They have enjoyed exploring our new space and being able to access the playground more easily.

Our focus book this term has been The Naughty Bus. We have loved reading the story together, acting it out with toy buses and passengers, and building tall towers like in London. The children have also been trying to read, write and spell key words from the book, according to their phonic level.

We have had a counting focus in maths this term. Children have been practising counting and have been exposed to numbers up to 30. They have all improved their skills when counting a group of objects and showing the correct numeral.

We continue to enjoy bucket time, carousel play and outdoor learning in Rufus. This has included lots of new crafts and sensory experiences, many based around a bus or transport theme. They have all been working hard on their fine motor skills in class, and their gross motor skills in gymnastics and trampoline sessions.



# Leeds Class

As part of PE this term Leeds class have taken part in Martial Arts lessons at a local gym.



The pupils have learnt the Importance of fitness as well as the disciplines of martial arts.

They have also practiced coordination, working together and communication/listening skills whilst having fun.

#### **Scotney Class**

We are delighted to share an update on the exciting activities and learning experiences that Scotney Class has engaged in throughout Term 1.

The class have settled into the new term very well, displaying enthusiasm and a positive attitude towards their studies and activities. This term, our students had the wonderful opportunity to visit the local shops in Wheel of Independence where they bought and paid for different ingredients. Their culinary skills were put to the test as they created a variety of dishes, including macaroni cheese, and also designed and made their own sandwich of choice. These activities not only provide practical life skills but also promote teamwork and creativity among the pupils.



As part of our history curriculum, the class embarked on a History trip to Knole Park in Sevenoaks. This excursion allowed the students to explore the impressive 600-year-old estate and visit the display rooms within the house. We also took the opportunity to observe Tudor-style homes in local villages, such as Eynsford, which has enriched our discussions and understanding of the period.

Furthermore, Scotney Class has been actively participating in weekly bike maintenance sessions held at the hub. During these sessions, the children are learning valuable skills while using various tools that are applicable in multiple contexts beyond just bicycle maintenance.









In addition to these hands-on experiences, swimming and yoga sessions have become an integral part of our curriculum this term. Students have also enjoyed their time in the outdoor learning area, where they have been exploring the seasonal changes that occur during autumn and identifying various objects unique to this time of year.

In Wheel of Independence we have been using the Commando Joe box and it has been such a success. The groups at the Hub have all been working hard to co-operate together more , show more empathy for one another and listen to one another more. We've been building shelters, crossing icy terrain, building sugar cube igloos as well pushing ourselves to the limit with jumping, planks and running challenges.

The box has been an amazing resource for our pupils, we have been so proud of all their efforts and look forward to more challenges in the future.



## Hever Class

This term, Hever class have been very busy with all aspects of their learning. We have been exploring landmarks around our local area in Geography. We have also been busy joining in with Gymnastics on a Monday morning, performing different rolls, jumps and stretches. In English, the class have engaged well learning about our superhero 'Traction Man', creating medals to celebrate our superhero saving the day!



## Corfe Class

It has been an excellent start to the new academic year in Corfe class. Work has taken place around developing friendships and building relationships with staff. The students have enjoyed being back in the routine of starting the day with their 'hello' song. Turn taking and communication skills have been developed in their daily Attention Autism sessions, as they have been enjoying choosing their preferred activities in Carousel Play. They have also engaged well in the OT sessions, which have focused on developing fine motor skills, as well as exposing students to a variety of different smells. The students have also been joining with Camber class for parachute games, which has been a great success.













#### **Rochester Class**



This term is all about the Romans! We have conquered Richborough Gateway and explored the ruins and learnt about roman trades of glass, jewellery and weapons. We navigated around the site and climbed the wooden replica gateway built in AD 43.



We visited the Foxenden farm to learn more about growing and producing local fruit. We picked apples, pears and raspberries and chose a pumpkin for Halloween. We practiced our life skills, weighed our fruit and paid the farmer.









#### Camber Class

Camber class have had a fantastic start to the new term. They have been using lots of maths manipulatives to develop their understanding of numbers and what they represent and have also been comparing objects and creating repeating patterns.

In English, they have enjoyed The Naughty Bus story and the work that they have been doing around this.

Science has also been lots of fun as they have explored a variety of animals, what they need to survive and where they live. The students have been making the most of the last bit of 'summer' weather by spending time in the new outdoor learning area, as well as the conservation area and the different playgrounds.



# Horticulture Group

The students have been tiding the Hub garden and making it ready for the winter.



They have covered the pond with mesh to stop the leaves falling into it, and the pond weed and water lily in the pond are growing well.








The students have also made a leaf pile in the garden which will help benefit the wildlife by:

Being a food source for hedgehogs, frogs, toads and newts. It can be used for a nest or bedding for hedgehogs and invertebrates, or be used as a hibernation shelter for hedgehogs. The leaf pile is in a tyre because we did not want the leaves blowing away in the wind.





This term the new students at the Hub have also started Coming to Curly's Farm. All the new students are really enjoying their time there and are joining in with the tasks set by the staff at the farm and getting to know the animals.

<u>ART</u>

Students have also been exploring the artist Rachel Parker and they have been exploring their own repeat surface pattern. They had to come up with a small design and then play around with scale and size and then incorporate their original design into a larger surface pattern.
