### Pryor














In Pryor class we have had lots of fun playing in the garden and visiting the park. We have also planted some sunflower seeds and are all excited to watch them grow.

This term our topic has been all about The Natural World including whereabouts different animals live. We went out into the community and have explored woodland habitats and farms. We found the park in the middle of the woods!




### Bell Class

Two of our pupils have a starring role in the West End!


Both Porcha and Eddie are featured on National Autistic Society promotional posters raising autism awareness.



#### THERAPEUTIC USE OF GARDENING AND BEING OUTSIDE

For our students taking part in garden activities like growing food or flowers, and participating in forest school type of activities, encourages a sense of accomplishment and responsibility. This can boost self-esteem and reduces anxiety and rumination through enabling relaxation.

#### OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY AND THE OUTDOORS

As Occupational Therapists we often have multiple aims within a session,

whether that's developing fine or gross motor skills, providing a rich sensory experience, or meeting the sensory needs of an individual by providing regulating sensory activities. These can all be done effectively outside in our playgrounds and garden spaces.

In our outdoor spaces there are lots of opportunities for using our hands to create things, to travel over different surfaces and to experience a range of different movement. This can help to meet our motor skill development needs.

There are also loads of opportunities for lots of different sensory stimulation, whether that's deep muscle work from carrying, lifting, digging and dragging; or vestibular input from swinging on swings, rope swings, or in a hammock; or tactile input from getting our hands in the soil when planting. There are so



many different ways that we can provide sensory input during meaningful activities outdoors, making our outdoor spaces a great place to meet those Occupational Therapy objectives.

Occupational therapist Hattie Mugleston has been making the most of our outdoor spaces, supporting our young people outside during her sessions and in enrichment.



#### MULTISENSORY IDEAS FOR AT HOME AND IN SCHOOL

It doesn't matter where you are, our outdoor spaces can provide us with a wide range of sensory experiences that can be grounding and supportive of self-esteem.

#### This could include:

- listening to birdsong,
- · smelling flowers or herbs such as mint,
- · feeling a breeze on their cheek,
- · gently swinging on a hammock
- feeling the grass on their bare feet (if safe to too so).
- or anything else that tunes them into their environment, makes them think and feel through their senses.

For our older and students who are able, you can also try talking about and reflecting on their feelings about nature, so tuning in with their emotional attachment to the space that they're in.

#### CALMING ACTIVITY IDEAS FOR AT HOME AND IN SCHOOL

Activities which require bearing weight through the hands are generally

calming for the nervous system. These could be used at the start of sessions if required to help calm pupils and / or at the end of sessions to help them transition back to the classroom. Calming activities could also be used if a pupil is starting to escalate, if it appears safe for them to do so. Therefore, it might be an idea to always have a full wheelbarrow or watering can to hand to direct pupils to if needed. Calming activities include: -

- Digging (easier in moist soil gets harder with drier soils);
- Moving soil on a spade e.g. to fill up a bucket encourage the pupil to try and move more and more soil per spadesful;
- Raking / hoeing;
- Pushing a wheelbarrow can vary the load and the distance travelled;
- Moving heavy items by hand e.g. bucket of soil, full watering can, bucket of stones;


