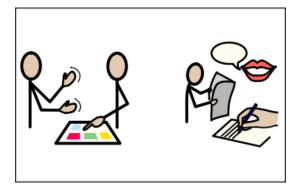
What's been happening in Caesar Class:

We have been settling in to our new classrooms and getting to know all our new friends. Caesar this year is very lucky to have access to two classrooms joined by our playground and a small sensory undercover playground. The children free flow between these areas with activities set up throughout to promote independence, autonomy of choice and encourage learning through play.

Our theme this half term is Me and My Family. We began by looking at the story "Elmer". We have talked about how we are all different and this makes us special. Colours have been explored in both creative and messy play! Caesar class have enjoyed the last of the summer sunshine in our playground with ice play, coloured water and rose petal potions. At the end of last year Caesar was donated some trellis to build a vertical herb garden so planting has begun! We have Coriander and Mint growing and plan to add more over the next few weeks.
