


LEEDS CLASS

Curly's Farm

The students have also been moving pigs from one end of the farm to the other and they have learnt how to use 'pig boards' to move the pigs.



They also moved a large animal hut from one end of the farm to the other. Great team work!





Scotney Class

Scotney class visited Fenn Bell Zoo to explore animal habitats and how animals adapt to living and surviving in different conditions.

Fenn Bell is a local conservation project that supports endangered species and regularly seeks donations from members of the public to support their campaign to help other animals.

Our Student Carmen is doing a Hairdressing course, learning tinting, blow drying and using curling tongs. She has also leant health and safety in the work place, risk assessing and communication skills.



Group 3 Wheel of Independence



During Wheel of Independence, the students have been looking at safety in the kitchen and using the



correct chopping boards. They have also looked into utensils used in the kitchen for people with disabilities and how to adapt the kitchen for them, and they went to the shops to find different utensils people with disabilities can use.



Warwick Class

In Wheel of Independence this term Warwick class have been learning about road safety, crossing the road, the dangers of not crossing a road properly and how to check the road to make sure it is safe. As a class they were able to identify any hazards on the road, why safety measures are put up in some areas and independently each student crossed the road identifying when it was safe to do so. Warwick also participated in different activities such as going on a bus, paying for their fares independently to Bluewater to buy lunch, going to Waterstones to purchase a book to read with their vouchers and enjoyed dressing up as a class for World Book Day.

Some of Group 1 have been visiting different music shops throughout the term. The boys initiated conversations with the shop owners and workers and discussed different instruments and music.


