#### Helen Allison School has been awarded Beacon Status





#### We are a Beacon of excellence in the field and so proud of this recognition!

HAS submitted their report to Autism Accreditation which had to provide evidence of quality and consistent support to autistic people but also demonstrated outstanding and innovative practice in sharing expertise and knowledge. Beacon status is the highest award Accreditation can give and is a considerable achievement.

The award is given to provisions which have already achieved an advanced award and in particular describes exceptional work that has had a significant impact on how families, professionals and the local community understand and respond to autistic people.

A panel of independent experts in the field found that the application "provides evidence of how a positive learning environment is created for autistic young people in the school."

The panel also noted the following as particular areas of strength and innovation:

- The sharing of practice with parents such as yoga sessions.
  - Themed stalls at Parents evenings.
    - Support for siblings.
- The involvement of autistic young people in their local community.
  - Police and Taxi / escorts training.
  - The application of the Quality-of-Life Framework.
- The contribution made to knowledge and understanding of autism through training activities, contribution to professional events and publication of articles and resources.

We are truly proud of this achievement which further evidences our mission statement: Our mission is to provide opportunities for improving quality of life for all of our pupils. Ensuring a holistic approach will assist our pupils with building self-confidence, resilience and independence, whilst on their educational journey and beyond. Creating strong partnership working with parents, enables us to motivate pupils to reach their dreams, goals and aspirations. We will support them to become the best version of themselves.

#### <u>Leeds</u> <u>Class</u>

Leeds class visited the Beaney

workshop. The pupils investigated real and replica
Stone Age tools from the museum collection and then
explored the galleries to search for artefacts
like hunter gatherers.













#### Curlys Farm

This term the students have been very busy looking after the animals at the farm, they have been cleaning out the pens, feeding and making sure they have plenty of water.

The students were also shown how to trim the sheep's hooves using special clippers and then they had a go at doing it themselves.

The students were also able to walk the Alpacas which was very cool.












#### **Group 4**

Group 4 went to Dockside to have their feet measured as part of the Wheel of Independence and they had to then find a pair of suitable shoes that they could fasten up themselves.















#### **Windsor Class**

Windsor class this term went to visit Horton Kirby as part of their topic 'Flow'. They enjoyed playing the river and throwing stones to make a splash. We discussed how the river moves and threw sticks and oranges in the river to see if we could see them again, and also tested whether we could run faster than the river. The children took samples of the water and the soil and drew pictures to help them with their topic when they came back to school.











#### Scotney Class



In Science Scotney class have been able to recognise that vibrations from sounds can travel.

To demonstrate this we used rice on a drum and by hitting the drum harder the larger the vibration recorded.

They have also been exploring Physical Features in Geography.

A trip to Gravesend Prom where they were able to use binoculars to look at the surrounding landscape.









#### **Corfe Class**



The topic this term has been Spring.

Corfe Class have explored spring weather by going out to Trosley Park, touching and feeling different textures and making mud pies.

Food safari we have been trying new things tasting and touching.

Corfe Class have also been exploring different animals and mini beast.

Corfe have been developing our play skills alongside each other and learning to share.



















#### **Group 2 WOI**

This term the students have been looking at household skills but they have also been learning about first aid, what is in a first aid box, how to put someone in the recovery position, how to do CPR and they also looked at a defibrillator and where you can find them out in the community.















#### **Horticulture Group**

The students have been preparing the flower beds and the garden ready for spring.

The students re-planted the hanging baskets and they also planted some pumpkin seeds and runner bean seeds.

















#### **Hub Mechanics Group**

This term the students have been learning new skills and putting them to good use. They have worked on a quad bike checking the engine and changing parts ready to try to start it up.







The students also worked on a smart car that needs restoring.





#### **Warwick Class**

In Wheel of Independence this term Warwick have been learning about house-keeping, self-care and laundry skills. These tasks included keeping the kitchen clean and tidy, selecting appropriate cleaning products and being able to complete different activities simultaneously.

The students explored the supermarkets and selected products that were used for both male and female hygiene and also looked at how to care for their teeth and took part in a practical cleaning teeth task!



Warwick Class also had the opportunity to take part in interactive Science lessons at the hub where they learnt about astronomy.







## Camber Class



Carousel play has included lots of dinosaur-themed sensory activities, such as; a dinosaur swamp with Gelli Baff, washing the dinosaurs with foam and water spray, burying dinosaurs in 'moon sand', and digging for dinosaurs. Carousel play gave us lots of opportunities to work alongside peers and adults, solve puzzles and explore objects and games in new ways. The children have all been working hard on their fine motor skills this term, through early morning tasks, regulation sessions and food safari, with Gemma and Erin. This is further supported by Write Dance sessions, where children learn to make early writing shapes to music. We are seeing great progress in number work this term. Children are using Numicon to represent numbers up to 20, as well as writing the numbers and counting objects. We have been making the most of the nicer weather, too. The class have had lots of fun together on the outdoor trampoline, enjoyed some water play, and gone on trips to local parks. We're so proud of everything Camber class are achieving!











#### **Hever Class — Science**

In Science we have been planting and growing seeds.

We have experimented growing plants in different environments and recording what plants need.



We have been growing larvae into caterpillars and waiting very patiently for them to emerge. We now have three beautiful butterfly's and will release them into the wild.







#### Hever Class — Trip

Hever class had a trip to Whitstable beach.

We have been looking at the artist Andy Goldsworthy, collecting stones, shells, seaweed and wood to create our own sculptures.



We had a wild time at Wildwood. We really enjoyed the animals, especially the bears and braved the rope path over their enclosure.

We were very lucky to see so many different animals including a baby wallaby!
