Group 4





As part of this terms wellbeing activities, Rochester class took a trip to Ninja Warrior. They had a great time trying to "beat the wall" and got very competitive against each




Jedd from Rochester class has been working hard this term during his Maths and Science lessons. He was tasked with measuring different items in the room and learning the difference between cm and mm.
