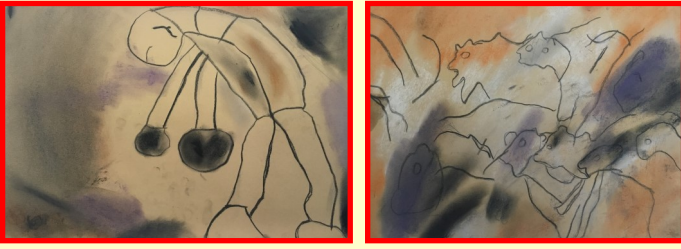


British Values

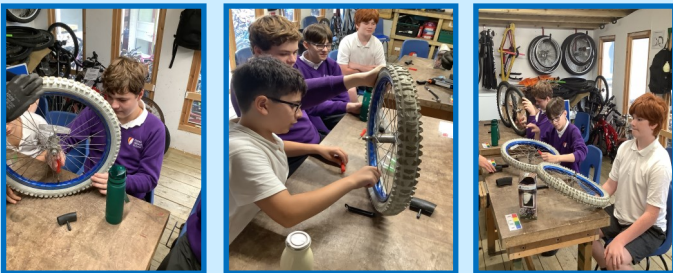
Cave Drawings



During Art lessons at the Hub, students have been exploring The History of Art and the very first known artworks and artists. Some students have been looking at the cave drawings from the Chavet Caves in France and have been trying to reproduce them using the same materials (chalks and charcoal) on textured paper. The students also thought about adding different types of symbols that were used in the cave drawings.

Horse riding

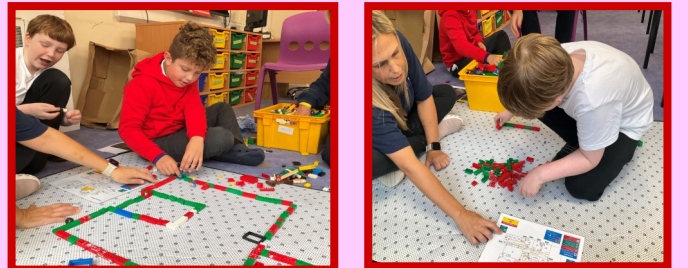
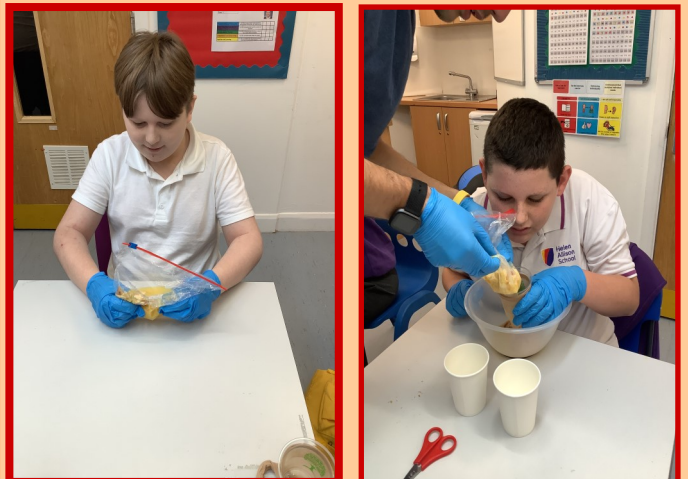

Digestive System

This term in Science, Scotney class have been looking at the digestive system and how it functions. They focused on the process from when the food enters our mouths to finally when it appears as waste. They practised this process with an experiment, using crackers, bananas, orange juice and water. Safe to say it was a messy and smelly experiment!

They also created their own set of teeth using marshmallows. They learnt about how many teeth we have and the roles of each tooth. They cut some of the marshmallows so that the teeth were different shapes and sizes.



This term Leeds class topic in Geography is 'Map Makers'. The class have been learning about different kinds of maps and looking at what differences they may be able to see. Tyler and Alasdair used the aerial view map of the school to create a map using Lego. They worked together to make the perimeter of the building with the different rooms inside.

Camber class have been working hard on their attention this term. Bucket time has been a real hit and students have done some great turn-taking and watching. In their Independent Living Skills lessons, the students have learnt some new skills in the kitchen and made sure to wash up afterwards! Make sure to let them practice at home mums and dads! Students are also working on their problem solving and fine motor skills, by completing tasks such as bead threading, puzzle making, and hanging monkeys on the tree! 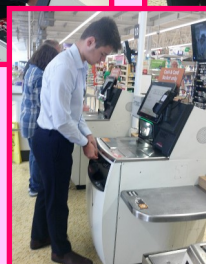
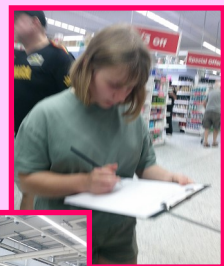
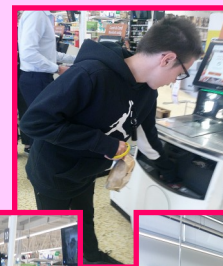
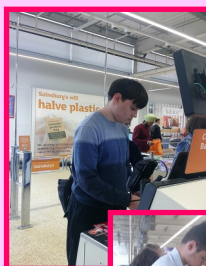
Corfe Class have had a wonderful time this term developing their independence, exploration and problem solving, communication and active learning skills. A huge amount of learning is also taking place through making cheese straws and jam tarts! The students have all been getting excited when they see on their schedules that it is time to go to the Independent Living Skills room for their weekly cooking session. During the sessions they have been learning life skills such as washing their hands before they start cooking, developing their understanding of the names and symbols of cooking equipment by matching the item to it's symbol, and have been really interested in exploring the texture, taste and smell of ingredients. They have also worked hard to develop their motor skills such as grating, mixing and pouring., followed by the hardest part - learning to wait patiently for their jam tarts and cheese straws to be cooked before finally tasting them!



This term, Group 3 have been developing their food shopping skills for their Wheel of Independence / Life Skills sessions on a Monday morning.

They have learned to price a selection of items, identify cheaper alternatives, including offers and the purpose of loyalty cards. As well as that, they have compared prices in two supermarkets and used the self-service and counter checkouts, where they had to engage in conversation at the till.

The students have worked really well on this topic and it has increased their confidence and independence.

Millbrook

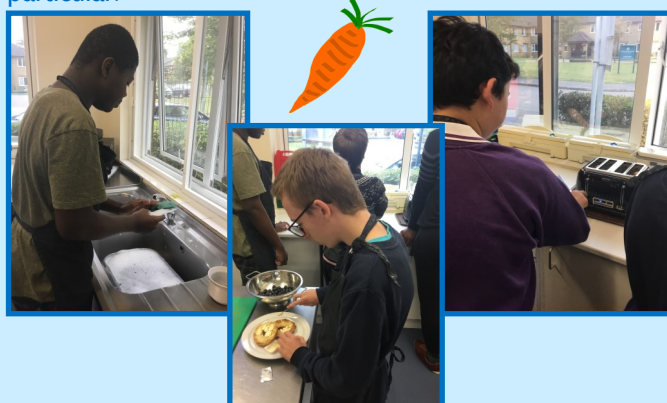


As part of their Science learning about 'Animals including Humans' Windsor class took a trip to the Millbrook Pet Centre. While there, they saw lots of different types of animals, some small, some furry and some that live in the water. They asked the man who worked in the shop very nicely if they could hold one of the small snakes and he was kind enough to say yes. They were very brave, took it in turns and listened to the man's instructions on how to hold the snake so that they didn't scare it. Windsor class learnt lots about different animals that day which helped them in their Science lessons when they came back to school.

Independent Skills



Group 4 have been working on their preparation of food this term and have had several trips to the supermarket to buy items on a shopping list. They have been focusing on how to find the items in different aisles using signage, using a hand held basket and using the self-checkout till. Their focus with the food preparation has been on knife skills, cutting, peeling and grating in particular.



Students also went offsite and had to independently find a specific item on the supermarket shelf. After the trip they came back and made a healthy snack using the items they had searched for.



Rufus class have had a very fun and exciting first term. There has been lots of exploring with the numicom, as well as being introduced to colourful semantics. The class have also already been learning about animals and how they can be grouped. The students enjoyed sorting the animals between those that live in water and those that live on land. There have been some English lessons in the library, which the students have really enjoyed for a change of scenery. As part of their European Day of Languages work, they learned about Wales and listened to some Welsh. A big focus of the term has been to promote independence, including life skills, cooking, trips into the community and engaging in breakfast club.



Curly's Farm

This year we have some new students going to Curly's farm and they have been working enthusiastically with the animals and the tasks needed to care for them.

Warwick class visited Woodlands Park as part of their science lesson. This term, during these lessons they have been measuring distance time and speed. They collected data at different distances to then record them into a graph.

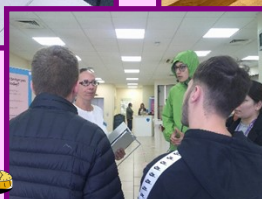


Paul Klee

This term, some students have been exploring the work of the artist Paul Klee especially his painting entitled Castle and Sun. They were tasked with reproducing an architectural structure using a variety of different geometric coloured shapes and simple lines.



During Group 2's Wheel of Independence lessons, they have been looking at different types of money. They have looked at the different types of coins and notes in circulation and had some items to "pay" for. They have used their money knowledge to work out which coins and notes to hand over and how much change they should receive. They have also been to a bank to see how bank cards work.

Please contact Francesca or Lynn if you have any problems with this system as step by step guides can be provided.

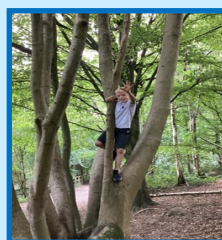
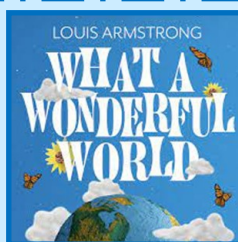
